SUMMER JOY FOR REFUGEE CHILDREN

When summer rolled in, many children refugee found themselves facing long, idle days. With schools closed and few structured activities available, their parents—often working multiple jobs—had little time or resources to plan anything for them. For children already navigating major life transitions, this lack of could feel engagement especially isolating.

But then, RHI stepped in.

Recognizing the need, we helped connect a group of children to a summer camp designed just for them. For many, it was their very first time attending such a program. From the moment they stepped onto the campgrounds, their world changed. The air was filled with laughter, songs, and squeals of excitement as they played games, made crafts,

learned new skills, and most importantly—made friends.

One child said with a big grin, "I didn't know camp could be like this. I want to come back every year!"

These few days may have seemed short, but the impact deep. The children was returned home with their eyes bright, their hearts light, and their spirits lifted. They didn't iust experience fun—they experienced joy, freedom, and a renewed sense of belonging. For those precious days, they weren't "refugee kids"—they were just kids. And that made all the difference.

But navigating leases, coordinating paperwork, and contacting employers was overwhelmingespecially with language barriers and no car. Stress began to take its toll. They were losing hope. RHI helped. We met with them, offering transportation, translation support, and guidance through unfamiliar systems. What

silence and worry, hoping they weren't too late. After the surgery, when we heard their story, we stepped in to bring her home and deliver groceries to help ease the burden of recovery. But more than food or transportation, we offered what they said they needed most: reassurance that they weren't alone.

This moment reminded us that compassion often arrives not as a grand gesture but as a quiet presence—someone willing to show up, listen, and walk beside others in their time of need.
